
UOLXART:DIS ART PRIZE 2825



ABOUT THE ART PRIZE

Launched in 2023, the biennial **UOL X ART:DIS Art Prize** is Singapore's first comprehensive platform that recognises all stages of artistic practice by artists with disabilities, celebrating their unique perspectives and providing opportunities to gain public visibility and patronage.

Returning for its second edition this year, the UOL X ART:DIS Art Prize has broadened its reach to welcome entries from all artists with disabilities in Singapore aged six and above. More than 570 works were received this year compared with over 300 submissions in its inaugural year. Eighteen original artworks have been selected through an open call from May to July 2025, showcasing the diversity of creative expression, each reflecting the artists' personal narratives, resilience and imagination.

This year's edition offers an increased prize pool of **\$\$52,000**, including a **\$\$20,000** grand prize accompanied by the opportunity for a solo exhibition, alongside awards across multiple age and category tiers.

The competition celebrates more than artistic excellence—it is a catalyst for visibility, opportunity and sustained development. With each biennial edition, UOL and ART:DIS reinforce a shared commitment to nurturing inclusive artistic journeys and deepening public engagement with the creative contributions of artists with disabilities.

WINNER

CHRISTIAN TAN WEN SIANG (b. 1994)

Christian is an observant and expressive artist whose practice draws inspiration from the everyday. With a discerning eye for line and form, he transforms ordinary objects into images that are at once direct and resonant. Currently a printmaker-in-training, he demonstrates fluency across both wet and dry techniques, employing reduction processes that lend his works a layered depth. His art resists ornamentation, opting instead for clarity and strength of imagery that speaks to both personal experience and the wider recognition of labour, care and the textures of daily life.

In Red Plumbing Set, Yellow Broom and Floor Scrubbing, Christian transforms everyday tools of labour into emblematic forms through layered reduction printing. Rendered in bold palettes, these familiar objects take on a quiet dignity, affirming the value of ordinary gestures while inviting reflection on the overlooked textures of daily life.

1ST RUNNER-UP

GAN JUN HUAN (b. 1998)



An architecture student at Singapore Polytechnic, Jun Huan moves fluidly across the languages of art, design and movement. As the only deaf member of a hearing family, she navigates multiple forms of communication—sign language, Mandarin, Malay and English—each shaping her artistic sensibilities. Her practice extends beyond the visual, finding expression in dance as part of the deaf crew Redeafination, reflecting a constant search for creativity and connection.



Drawing on memory and cultural heritage, Jun Huan's works—Morning Memories of Joo Chiat; Local Bites, Different Vibes and Hot or Iced, It's Still Kopi—explore the atmospheres of Singapore's communal spaces. From the intimacy of Peranakan kuih shared with her grandmother to the rhythms of hawker centres, coffee shops and food courts, her drawings capture the sensory richness of local food culture, situating personal experience within broader narratives of belonging.

LING TECK MONG (b. 1962)



Teck Mong's journey as an artist began with a love for comics, a form that allowed him to bring his imagination to the page. Following a road accident in 1981 that left him paralysed from the waist down, he turned more deeply to art—not as an escape, but as a way forward. Through community art programmes and years of practice, he steadily refined his technique, expanding his portfolio to encompass drawing and painting, each infused with narrative vitality. His art is a testament to resilience, imagination and the transformative potential of creativity.

挑战 (Challenge)

In 挑战 (Challenge), Teck Mong conveys resilience not as defiance but as composure. Accompanied by the Mandarin characters "有如环境,虽然我无法比你快。我还是坦然面对,让我内心战斗力提升," which translate as: "Although I can't be faster than you, I still face it calmly, which strengthens my inner fighting spirit," the work embodies his philosophy of perseverance, transforming personal circumstance into a universal vision of strength and dignity.

MIMI NG YIT MING (b. 1961)

Mimi likes flower embroidery and painting, and always wears jeans. She wanted to combine all of these with Singapore Sign Language, so that people can learn how to sign "Bloom".

Mimi graduated with a diploma in graphic design from Lasalle-SIA College of the Arts. She has worked as an artist, a cartoonist, a potter and an architectural draftsperson. At present, she is a full-time entrepreneur who sells her craftworks through social media. Mimi is keen to experiment with the different media so as to widen her knowledge in art. Born deaf, she sees art as her greatest interest, as it is an effective means of communication.


MUHD RAYQAL AIDAN BIN MUHD RAPID (b. 2014)


RAYMOND LAU POO SENG (b. 1968)

Raymond belongs to a new generation of Singaporean artists who are at the forefront of the city-state's evolution into a Renaissance City. A colourful individual, he views painting as a therapeutic process that brings him peace and fulfilment. Raymond received a Bachelor's in Fine Arts from the University of Tasmania, and was honoured with the UOB Painting of the Year award in 1993 and the Young Artist Award in 2001. His body of realist and abstract works can be found in the collections of Ambassador-at-Large Professor Tommy Koh, Professor Arthur Lim, Mr Tan Swie Hian, Ms Chng Seok Tin, Singapore Management University, United Overseas Bank and the National Arts Council.







WINNER OF UOL X ART:DIS ART PRIZE 2023

FERN WONG

Fern Wong won the top prize in the inaugural UOL X ART:DIS Art Prize 2023, with "PAPERAZZI", a vibrant paper-cut composition that transformed humble church bulletin sheets into exuberant bursts of colour and form. Rooted in her fascination with natural motifs, "PAPERAZZI" embodies Fern's meticulous process, with each layer patiently handcut to evoke the rhythms of growth and renewal.

Since her win, Fern has continued to expand her practice. As part of her award, she received the opportunity to stage a solo exhibition. In 2024, she presented "Natural Geometry" at Objectifs, her first solo retrospective, which brought together nearly 40 works spanning two decades of her practice. In 2025, her work was featured at the World Expo in Osaka as part of Singapore's Pavilion, where it was showcased in Magic Hour—a captivating light-art and music installation set within the Pavilion's Dream Forest. She is also featured in the 2025 Gallery Children's Biennale at National Gallery Singapore, where young audiences are invited to explore an interactive installation inspired by her intricate paper-cut artworks.

Fern's journey is a testament to the quiet power of resourcefulness, imagination and the belief that art can transform the everyday into something extraordinary.
